ALTAR BONSAI COURTESY OF SAM SHEPHERD



You may have noticed the presence of several bonsai trees on the alter over the past several weeks; these trees represent the 'family tree' of Abraham that we have been exploring through our study of Genesis. The trees have been supplied by Susan and Gary Shepherd's son Sam Shepherd who has been practicing bonsai art for over 15 years. Sam has a collection of 10 bonsai trees that he has been caring for over that time, some of which he acquired in a 'prebonsai' state (field grown trees) and developed into a refined traditional bonsai form. While some are more refined than others, all bonsai are considered to be in a constant state of development as they grow and change. His trees range in age from 15 to over 90 years old. He has both deciduous and coniferous trees that include maple, Japanese Beech, azalea, hornbeam, Japanese Black Pine and Ezo Spruce.

The most challenging aspect of bonsai is most certainly patience and restraint. A bonsai's development often passes through the hands of many artists as they can survive indefinitely with the proper care. "We are merely caretakers along its journey. Observing a tree respond to everything from ever-changing environmental conditions, watering, fertilization, to trimming its limbs is imperative to support a healthy tree".

This Advent, may you remember that you belong to a story etched into the wrinkles of time, to generations that have come before and will come after, to a love that won't let you go.



WHAT IS AN EQUPPING CHURCH?

On behalf of your Equipping Team, I would like to share an overview of what is involved in Equipping. This overview was written and shared by Janet Kearsley who was an original member of the Equipping Team and who currently serves on our Vision Team.

"An Equipping Church starts with its people, not with its structure. It works to encourage and equip its people to find their deepest connections to each other and to God. It does this by creating a trusting and transparent atmosphere that says Yes to people's gifts; that encourages people to do what makes them feel holy and alive; and that is bottom up rather than top down. It's a bit like a potluck supper where each person brings their special food—and with some love, faith and flexibility, it all works. And not only works, but is filled with spirit and warmth. 
